It started with the most anticipated dress of the year — the royal wedding dress. One of the first details noticed about Middleton's wedding dress was the lace bodice and sleeves. She made lace in bridal wear look modern and youthful. Then this past summer as she embarked on her first royal tour — to Canada — the first outfit, from a wardrobe that was breaffile-saly chronicled around the world during the tour, was a nevy lace dress by Montreal designer Erdem.

But if Kate put a fresh youthful spin on lace, it is also designers who seemed to rediscover the feminine appeal of this filigree fabric.

Miuccia Pruda ignited this lace love affair with her fall 2008 collection, which featured heavily textured Swiss lace.

Fast forward to this fall and other influential designers from Marc Jacobs to Tom Ford featured the peek-a-boo material in their collections.

And you can expect the lace race to continue into next year as various merchants — such as Banana Republic, which previewed next season's collections to the press this week — featured lovely lace dresses in pale springtime colours.
