"You can watch this on any Saturday in the stores," laughs Walter Dimini, divisional merchandise manager at Tip Top Tailors. "I want to say to them, 'You're not going to wrestle in it. You're not going to do parallel bars in it. You don't need a ton of room."

"It might be a cultural thing," says Franco Rocchi, senior VP of sales and marketing at Le Chateau. "The girls can articulate their insecurities about how they feel in a dress, but the guys would never do that. They want to appear like they don't care. They might be happy with the suit, but they are not going to say it or ask someone how they look."

While two identical dresses showing up at prom can be cause for tears and teenage trauma, identical prom suits is a non-issue for the males.
